

## Upcoming NHTSA Campaigns

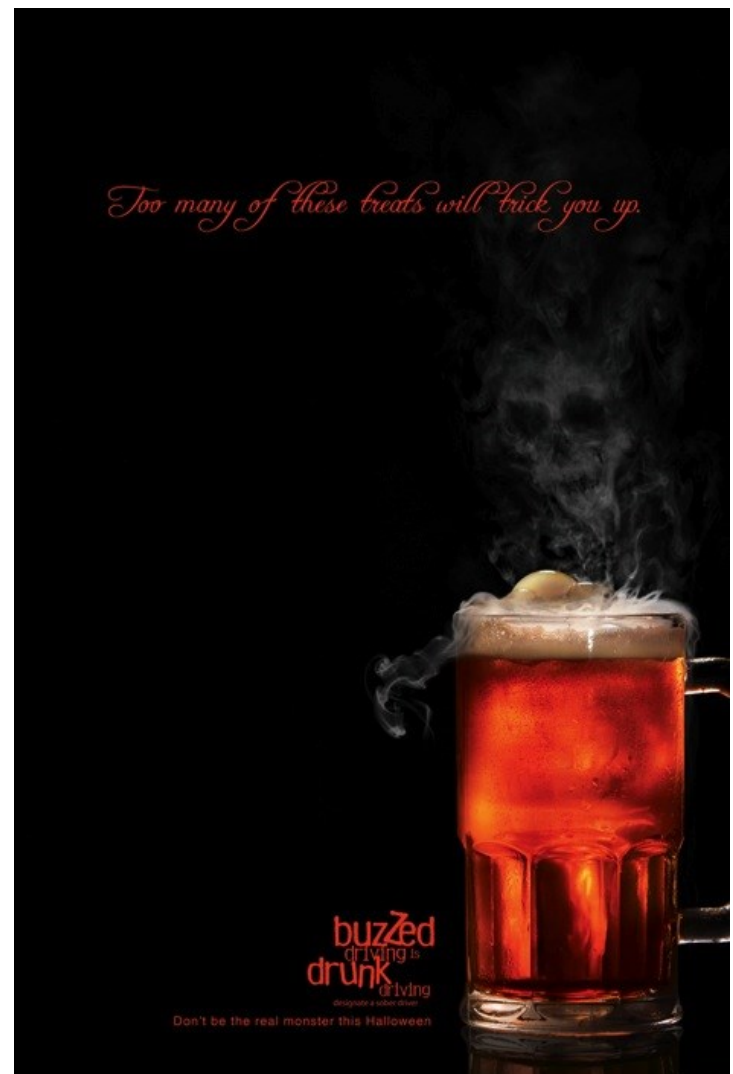
From 2012 to 2016, 44% of all people killed in motor vehicle crashes on Halloween night (6:00 PM October 31st to 5:59 AM November 1st) were in crashes involving a drunk driving, according to NHTSA statistics. Children out trick-or-treating, and those accompanying them, are also at risk, as 14% of pedestrian fatalities on Halloween night (2012-2016) involved drunk drivers. Younger people are most at risk: The 21- to 34-year-old age group accounted for the most fatalities (46%) in drunk-driving crashes on Halloween night in 2016.

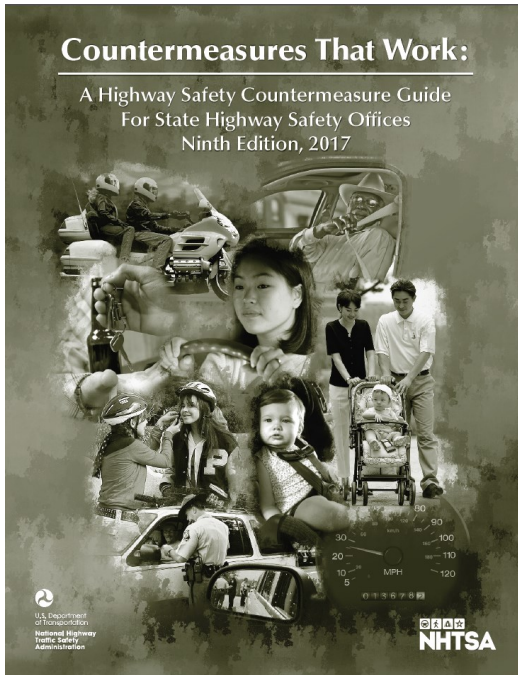
